# **Advocacy Recap**

The League of Women Voters NYS would like to thank all of our members and advocates for your efforts this session. We're proud to share that two key bills on our legislative agenda were successfully passed

The ERIC Bill (S1356A/A3649B)- The Electronic Registration Information Center is the most effective tool available to help election officials maintain more accurate voter rolls. It passed



earlier this year in the Senate and will now go to the Governor to sign. This bill will allow NY to join a multistate voter list maintenance organization like ERIC. Read more here.

The MAID Act (S.138 Hoylman-Sigal/A.136 Paulin)- The Medical Aid in Dying act would allow a terminally ill, mentally capable adult to request life-ending medication from a doctor to self- administer at a time of their choosing. This bill would afford terminally ill New Yorkers greater peace and the ability to die with dignity. Read more here.

Please take a minute to reach out to Governor Hochul and ask that she sign both pieces of legislation when they reach her desk.

League of Women Voters Buffalo/Niagara (July 17th)-LWV of Buffalo/Niagara is hosting the Good Trouble Lives On Rally in honor of Congressman John Lewis on July 17th at Niagara Square in Buffalo from 5pm-7pm. Prior to that they will be holding a poster making event on July 10th. This event has much success bringing in approximately 20-25 rally poster makers. LWV Buffalo/ Niagara will also be tabling at the Disabilities Pride Festival on July 26th.





League of Women Voters Rockland County (July 4th)-LWV of Rockland County is hosting a reading of the Declaration of Independence on July 4th in Nyack. They hope to bring in league members as well as locals to the event. They aim to remind citizens on the importance of the foundational document during a time when our democracy is under attack on many fronts.

League of Women Voters Larchmont/Mamaroneck (June 26th)- LWV Larchmont/Mamaroneck held its annual meeting on June 26th and sponsored a program with the

Community Resource Center featuring a presentation by an immigration attorney. Co-president Beth Radow released episode 1 of "This is What Democracy Looks Like" which was screened at the 2025 State Convention. Click <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a> to watch.

League of Women Voters Chautauqua (June 19th)- LWV Chautauqua hosted a voter registration and informational table at their local Juneteenth Celebration.

League of Women Voters of New York City-LWVNYC partnered with the WNBA's 2024 Champion New York Liberty at their Barclays Center home games, to register NYers and GOTV in the run-up to the NYC Primaries and to conduct in person balloting for this year's Citywide Participatory Budgeting program, giving thousands of New Yorkers a chance to have their say in how the city spends its money.



League of Women Voters of the Hamptons, Shelter Island & North Fork LWV of Hamptons, Shelter Island & North Fork held a fundraising tour on June 3 of both the Wildlife Refuge in Quogue, and the Wildlife Rescue Center in Hampton Bays, with a buffet lunch in between. On June 9, the local league held two virtual candidate debates via Southampton Town's YouTube channel, for both the Southampton Village Mayoral candidates and also the Southampton Village Trustees. On June 14, several of their members attended the "No Kings" rallies in East Hampton and in Sag Harbor.

League of Women Voters Syracuse Metro Area (June 12th)-The LWV Syracuse Metro Area held its annual dinner and business meeting on June 12, 2025. At the meeting our representative to the Students Inside Albany Conference, Firyal Abbas, gave a report about her experience at the conference. The ceremonies and held several times a week and usually there are 150+ new citizens.
