
As we head toward the November elections, it's a great time to reflect on the vital role local elections play in strengthening the foundation of our democracy. Local elections have a powerful impact on our daily lives, as they determine who oversees vital services like schools, police, public transportation, housing, and infrastructure. These elections often have very low turnout,

meaning each vote carries significant weight in shaping policies and priorities. Truly every vote counts in local races. By voting locally, you're helping decide how your neighborhood is run and who will represent your interests at the most immediate level. Across New York, our local Leagues have been hard at work doing outreach for local elections by, hosting voter registration drives, organizing candidate forums, and sharing vital election information through Vote411.

At the state level, LWVNYS has been actively supporting this work by distributing printed Voter Guides, assisting with Vote411 coordination, and preparing several statewide voter education initiatives.

Additionally, the LWVNYS Board is reviewing all Directions to the Board we received at Convention, including the proposed Empty Chair Policy, and will address them during the upcoming September 26 Board Meeting.

The League of Women Voters of New York State (LWVNYS) continues to emphasize that true progress in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) is not achieved through one-time or transactional efforts. At the June LWVNYS Convention, the "Building Bridges



to Excellence" Recognition Award honored the **League of Women Voters of the Hamptons, Shelter Island, and North Fork** for their exceptional commitment to DEI. Led by Terry Wildrick and supported by President Susan Wilson, their initiative stood out for its intentionality, reflection on both successes and challenges, and its alignment with the goals of sustainable DEI practices.

The review process, led by Committee Co-chair Crystal Joseph, also recognized three additional Leagues—Albany, Rivertowns, and Syracuse Metro—for their thoughtful submissions. These entries, along with past honorees from 2022 and 2023, are now part of an evolving collection of DEI "Success Stories." Collectively, these efforts reflect a growing awareness and response to systemic issues like racism, sexism, and other forms of discrimination, reinforcing the League's commitment to fostering a more inclusive democracy.



"Good Trouble Live On" Recap

July 17th marked the 5th anniversary of Congressman John Lewis's passing. To honor his legacy of making "Good Trouble" for effective change, communities across the nation hosted rallies/protests to stand up against the current state of our democracy.





League of Women Voters NYS Democracy During Detention Act Campaign Director, Clyanna Lightbourn, joined Ulster County's 'Good Trouble Lives On' rally. She emphasized that too many eligible individuals in New York jails remain unable to vote—not due to law, but systemic neglect—and detailed her work advancing the Democracy During Detention Act to secure absentee ballot access behind bars.

Special shout out to all of our league members who joined in the "Good Trouble Lives On" rallies to stand up for democracy and mobilize voters.

Local Leagues make Good Trouble Live On

League of Women Voters Buffalo/Niagara- On July 17, 2025, the Buffalo-Niagara League held the John Lewis *Good Trouble Lives On* Rally in downtown Buffalo. Executive Mark Polancarz, NYS Assembly members Taisha St. Jean Tard, Carla Speranzo, Jeffrtey Elder, Common Council member Zeneta Everhart along with community leaders spoke to the crowd of approximately 500 enthusiastic protesters.





League of Women Voters Schenectady County- in partnership with the NAACP, Unite NY and First United Methodist Church, led a successful *Good Trouble Lives On* rally on July 17 th. About 200 people gathered in Collins Park, waved protest signs along a busy street and then marched across a bridge, symbolic of John Lewis. The rally received a front-page article in the local newspaper, The Gazette, and several new members. Pictures are also available on their Facebook page, view here.

League of Women Voters Port Washington-Manhasset-Despite sweltering heat, LWV of Port Washington-Manhasset co-hosted the only *Good Trouble Lives On* event in Nassau County. Their partnership with the Social Justice Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Shelter Rock was so successful, they are looking forward to planning future events. About 500 people attended including members from other Nassau County Leagues and 8 other non-profit groups. The rally had 11 speakers, including President Regina Goutevenier, catchy chants and guitar-accompanied folk songs. The co-hosts received over 100 individual feedback from those wildly enthusiastic about the energy, about learning more, about leaving with a list of action items.



This event commemorates the passage of the 19th amendment in 1920 which ensured that no one was barred from voting due to their gender. August 26th, 1920 was the finish of a 72-year battle for women as a gender, nationwide, to get the right to vote. We use this day to thank and recognize the many women who fought for this right, share some of the history that followed, and discuss some current issues we need to be aware of.
